Welcome to *The Mountaineer*, a resource for progressives and a guide for advocates across Colorado, published by GSG and ProgressNow Colorado. Research presented in this publication is the result of a survey conducted between June 2 and June 8, 2022, among 800 registered voters in Colorado, plus an oversample of 150 Adams County voters for a total of 214 voters in Adams County. The margin of error at the 95% confidence level for Colorado voters is +/-3.4%. The margin of error on sub-samples is greater.

This eleventh publication will focus on Colorado voters' attitudes on some of the most salient issues of the day – abortion and guns. See our tenth report for more on the political landscape in Colorado heading into the fall general election.

VOTERS OPPOSE OVER-TURNING ROE AND PREFER DEMOCRATS ON ABORTION



Voters trust Democrats on the issue of abortion over Republicans by 20 points. By a two-to-one margin, voters oppose overturning *Roe v*. *Wade*, with a plurality of lessconservative Republicans joining overwhelming majorities of Democrats and unaffiliateds in opposing the decision. MESSAGING AROUND ABORTION HELPS DEM ELECTORAL CHANCES



Democrats can run up the score with key groups and even gain considerable leads with traditionally non-Democratic groups like white men, older whites, and less-conservative Republicans when focusing the 2022 election on abortion. The issue also significantly boosts Democratic motivation to participate in November.

A DEBATE ON COLORADO'S GUN LAWS IS A WINNER FOR DEMOCRATS



Voters want to see action on gun violence, reject the GOP "solution" for school shootings, and would reward Democratic candidates in a debate over Colorado's background check, magazine limit, and red flag laws. However, they also express some concern about Democrats going too far (though not as much concern as they have about Republicans not doing enough).

Key groups of Colorado voters trust Democrats on the issue of abortion and do not want to see *Roe* overturned

Voters prefer Democrats to handle the issue of abortion, giving them a 20-point lead over Republicans on an issue that has the potential to define this election in a major way.

Women, college-educated, and swing suburban voters (including those in Adams County) look to Democrats on this issue.

Further, a clear majority of voters and nearly every key subgroup, even Republicans who are not very conservative, oppose the Supreme Court's imminent overturning of *Roe v. Wade* and want to see the right to abortion protected under federal law. Again, women, college-educated voters, and swing suburban voters feel especially strongly.

Democrats who support abortion rights make up significant ground running against Republicans who want to ban/criminalize them

Democrats benefit when the generic ballot is framed around the issue of abortion, with a Democrat who supports the right to an abortion or the right to choose an abortion outpacing a Republican who wants to ban or criminalize abortion by strong double digits. While there are minor differences in the language test we conducted, it appears that **the strongest framing is a Democrat who supports the right to abortion* versus a Republican who wants to criminalize it.**

The Democratic margin improves by 23 points when voters consider the issue of abortion, with the largest gains among center-right voters and sizeable improvements among nearly every demographic group, including traditionally less-Democratic groups like white men, white non-college voters, and white older voters.

A regression analysis shows that "right to an abortion" is stronger than "right to choose an abortion."*

Abortion is a big motivator for Democratic voters, especially when they are made aware of GOP intentions after *Roe*

Initially, intense Democratic motivation to vote lags just slightly behind Republican motivation, with some important Democratic-leaning groups like young people and voters of color among the least motivated. But when voters are asked to consider the general election in the context of the overturning of *Roe v. Wade*, Democrats perk up. The result is especially impactful among key groups like Democrats, young voters, voters of color, and white women when they are made aware of Republican intentions to pass bans on abortion in Colorado and nationwide.

[SPLIT] As you may know, Republicans in Colorado and in Congress have said that when *Roe* is overturned, they will seek to pass bans on abortion at the state and national level.

Messaging around a national ban and the lack of a rape exception are particularly potent with swing voters

Democrats have several effective messages to make the case against Colorado Republicans in 2022 – which are also effective with political swing voters (those who do not vote straight Democrat or straight Republican on every ballot in the survey – a group that leans to the center-right).

Even though voters were given the explicit option to indicate that they didn't believe these messages (which usually depresses message scores), the top messages are convincing to 60% of voters, with strong intensity, and most are quite believable.

The "Rape" and "National Ban" messages emerge as a bit stronger than the others among **swing voters**, while swing voters are a slightly more skeptical about claims that Republicans would jail women or doctors over abortions in the case of rape and incest, that the Roe decision could lead to a samesex marriage ban, and that Republicans would criminalize abortion in the case of ectopic pregnancies.


Please indicate how convincing each is as a reason to vote against Colorado Republicans up and down the ballot in 2022. If you don't believe the statement, please choose that option.

Colorado voters clearly see the Republican position as an "extreme" and "out of touch" attack on women

Responding to open-ended questions after the battery of critiques against Republicans on abortion, **voters are most concerned about women losing the right to make choices about their own bodies** and use words like "extreme," "dangerous," "outdated," and "out of touch" when describing the GOP position on abortion.

After reading these statements, what <u>concerns you the most</u> about Republicans' position on abortion?



"They are trying to **control a woman's body** when the choice should be the woman's choice. No one should decide **what a women does with her body**."

"That it is the first step in overturning personal rights of privacy and autonomy over our bodies and lives."

"They want to criminalize women and take their choice away."

"The issue of abortion extends to other privacy rights and could **destroy other long held precedents** that have nothing to do with abortion."

"Their position is **dangerous**, and they have no right deciding how a woman can choose to decide whether or not they want an abortion or to use birth control." After reading these statements, how would you <u>describe</u> Republicans' position on abortion in your own words?



"They are trying to set us back 100 years and take away a women's right to choose."

"They do not support abortions and are **out of touch**."

"They are trying to **control** people."

"Extreme invasion of women's rights"

"Radical, **extreme**, and unfair"

"Their position is very **disturbing**. It is an attack on women."

"The Republicans are **out of touch and extreme** and do not care about the babies after birth."

Voters want action on gun violence but also have some concern about Democrats going too far


The topic of guns is a bit more nuanced than the issue of abortion.

Though voters clearly dislike the gun lobby, the NRA is only just below water, with unaffiliateds having a more positive (but still ultimately negative) view of the group. And only a slight majority worry more about Republicans not doing enough to address gun violence than Democrats going too far in restricting gun rights – with a massive gender gap among white voters on this question.

However, a clear majority agrees with the notion that the better way to protect kids from mass shootings is to prevent the bad guys from getting guns, not by adding more doors and security guards to schools. **On both questions, the** swing suburbs tilt strongly toward the progressive position.



However, a debate over Colorado's gun laws is a clear electoral winner for Democrats

When the generic ballot is re-framed around the gun violence prevention laws that Colorado has put in place in recent years (specifically, background checks, magazine limits, and red flag laws), **a Democrat who supports these laws trounces a Republican who wants to eliminate them by a 23-point margin** (a 17-point improvement on the straight generic ballot). Democratic gains are particularly large with center-right voters, and white women, older voters, and college-educated voters.

Meanwhile, voters want to take these laws a step further and support raising the age required to purchase an assault weapon from 18 to 21 by a whopping 59-point margin.

As you may know, in recent years, Colorado has implemented laws that require background checks on all gun sales, banned magazines that hold more than 15 rounds of ammunition, and allowed a judge to temporarily take away someone's gun if they were deemed a danger to themselves or others.

With that in mind: Thinking about the election for state legislature again, if the election were today, for whom would you vote – a Democrat who supports these laws, or a Republican who wants to eliminate them?

About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 800 registered voters in Colorado, plus an oversample of 150 voters in Adams County for a total of 214 interviews with Adams County voters, between June 2 and June 8, 2022. The margin of error at the 95% confidence level for Colorado voters is +/- 3.4%. The margin of error on sub-samples is greater. The survey was conducted over the phone and online, with online respondents recruited from multiple opt-in online panel vendors. Respondents were verified against a voter file, and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of Colorado's registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables including party registration, race, gender, age, education, region, and population density.

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
