Welcome Back to The Mountaineer

Welcome to *The Mountaineer*, a resource for progressives and a guide for advocates across Colorado, published by GSG and ProgressNow Colorado. Research presented in this publication is the result of a survey conducted between October 6 and October 11, 2022, among 800 registered voters in Colorado. The margin of error at the 95% confidence level for Colorado voters is +/- 3.5%. The margin of error on sub-samples is greater.

We also applied a second weight scheme to review results among a sample that is representative of the likely 2022 electorate. All results in this report are among registered voters unless otherwise noted.

This twelfth publication will focus on the political landscape and the major issues voters are focused on a month before the midterm elections, including voters' views on the parties and who they prefer at the top of the ticket.

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DEMOCRATS IN CO ARE WELL-POSITIONED TO SWEEP THE TOP STATEWIDE RACES



Democrats have strong advantages on multiple metrics, including party self-identification, the generic ballot for state legislature, elected official and candidate favorability ratings, and in each of the four statewide races — in which Polis, Bennet, Weiser, and Griswold all enjoy solid leads.

THE GOP BRAND IS IN TATTERS AND MADE WORSE BY GANAHL DOUBLING DOWN ON "FURRIES"



Voters believe Republicans are out of touch and have the wrong priorities, especially when it comes to the issues of abortion, helping corporations over families, and pleasing Trump. Heidi Ganahl has only made matters worse with her recent decision to focus on "furries" in schools – a decision that has been met with mockery and eyerolls from Colorado voters who call her comments "ridiculous."


ABORTION REMAINS A MOTIVATING ISSUE




Coloradans oppose overturning *Roe v*. *Wade* and believe women should have access to abortion care in CO. Twothirds think that if the GOP takes power in Colorado, then they will try to ban abortion. Perhaps most important, when a Democratic message on abortion is matched against a GOP message on the economy, it shifts the vote towards Democrats by 9 points.

The partisan environment bodes well for Colorado Democrats in the weeks leading up to Election Day

Democrats lead Republicans on all partisan metrics, including every vote at the top of the ticket. The political environment in the state looks as positive for Democrats as it has in months. Democrats have 7-point advantages on Party ID and the generic ballot, and personal ratings for Biden, Polis, and Bennet are all up since June, while Trump finds himself at a new low in our polling. Biden's job approval is also up, while Polis' remains steady and strong – about where it's been going back to September of 2020. Finally, Democrats (average motivation of 8.95 on our 0-10 scale) and Republicans (8.96) are also now dead even on motivation after Republicans had a modest advantage in June.





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
Polis continues to dominate at the top of the ticket


Polis has proven to be a formidable incumbent, as his marks, including personal favorability, job approval, and performance in the race for his re-election, are notably strong. He is well-known, consistently well-liked, and enjoys the highest job approval he has since this time last year.

In the race for governor, he enjoys an 18-point lead with likely November voters. Importantly, he over-performs a generic Democrat for state legislature with all groups, but especially with unaffiliateds, voters of color, white men, and outside of the Denver Metro area (defined as Denver, Boulder, Adams, Arapahoe, Jefferson, and Broomfield Counties).

Meanwhile Ganahl is only known by 54% of Colorado voters.

Polis as Governor









Bennet leads by double-digits and overperforms with key groups

Bennet also commands strong ratings and vote share in his race for re-election. Four in five voters can rate him, and they like him even more now than they did over the summer as his name ID has increased (79% familiar, up from 72% in June).

He enjoys a double-digit lead in the race for Senate with likely November voters. Like Polis, he over-performs a generic Democrat for state legislature with all groups, but especially with unaffiliateds, voters of color, and white non-college voters.

Meanwhile Republican challenger O'Dea is underwater with the twothirds of voters who can rate him.





Weiser and Griswold also enjoy solid leads

Other statewide Democrats enjoy healthy leads in their races against crowded fields and when matched against their main Republican opponents. Like Polis and Bennet, Attorney General Phil Weiser and Secretary of State Jena Griswold not only lead their GOP challengers (John Kellner and Pam Anderson) by healthy margins, but also over-perform a generic Democrat. In both races, these candidates consolidate registered Democrats better than Republicans consolidate their base and over-perform significantly with Republicans and white non-college voters. Griswold also significantly over-performs with unaffiliated voters. These Democrats also run up the score in the Denver Metro region while still keeping it close in the rest of the state.

These leads may be driven, in part, by voters' expectations that candidates for office should be willing to call out members of their own party who spread election conspiracies – something Anderson and Kellner have refused to do.

Republicans are viewed as extreme, out of touch, and having the wrong priorities

Voters overwhelmingly believe that the Republican Party is out of touch and has the wrong priorities. Before asking any other questions about the GOP in Colorado, we asked voters to describe the Party in one word. After "conservative," these responses were dominated by negative impressions – "extreme," "corrupt," "selfish," and "delusional."

When we dug into how voters perceive the Republican Party on a range of dimensions, a sizeable majority of Colorado voters say that the GOP is out of touch and has the wrong priorities – caring more about banning abortion, helping giant corporations, and pleasing Trump than improving the economy, helping working families, or doing what's best for Colorado.

Moreover, while a majority of voters believe that Governor Polis and Colorado Democrats are focused on the right issues, a majority believe that Colorado Republicans are not. How would you describe the Republican Party in one word?

Dems continue to lead on most issues and have made significant gains on abortion and economic metrics

Democrats have also improved their position on most issues, with **the biggest gain since February coming, unsurprisingly, on the issue of abortion**. Beyond that, they have also made solid gains on various economic issues that are traditionally Republicans' strongest issues – at least in part because voters believe Polis and Colorado Democrats have taken real action to save families money. Democrats have also expanded their leads on looking out for the working and middle classes and bringing down the cost of health care and prescription drugs.

Ganahl's "furries" comments draw ridicule

Heidi Ganahl's decision to focus on the issues of "furries" is being met by Colorado voters as the joke that it is.

Just 17% agree that "there is a widespread movement in CO public schools of kids dressing up as 'furries' and identifying as cats." And, when told of Ganahl's comments, seven in 10 voters say that this is NOT an important issue in the race for governor.

In your own words, what do you think about Ganahl's claim that kids are identifying as cats all over Colorado?

"She smokes too much pot."

"I honestly don't care. I don't think that is an issue that a governor should be addressing."

"That is so ridiculous that it makes me question the content of her character and her intention on taking politics seriously."

"While I don't agree with gender pronouns and identifying as something other than a man or a woman, there are way more important things that politicians should be focused on".

As you may know, Heidi Ganahl has recently made the issue of so-called "furries" a focus of her campaign for governor, saying "kids are identifying as cats all over Colorado and schools are tolerating it.





Voters continue to overwhelmingly support abortion rights – and understand that the GOP wants to ban abortion

Colorado voters oppose SCOTUS' decision to overturn *Roe* by a margin similar to what we saw in June. Now, an even stronger 70% agree that all women in Colorado should have access to abortion care (up from 67% in February). **Meanwhile, nearly two thirds of voters believe that if the GOP takes power in Colorado,** they will try to ban abortion here; and big margins also believe that if they take power in DC, they'd try to ban abortion nationwide and that electing O'Dea would make it more likely that the Senate would vote to ban abortion.

Abortion outweighs the economy as a voting issue

In a test of just how powerful abortion is as a voting issue relative to the economy, we reframed the generic legislative ballot as a choice between a Democrat who supports Biden's policies on taxes and inflation and will also fight to protect a woman's right to choose an abortion versus a Republican who will fight to lower taxes and combat inflation and will vote to ban abortion, even in the case of rape or incest. The result was a 9-point increase in the Democratic lead compared to the straight generic ballot. The data are clear that when abortion is matched against taxes and inflation as an issue, it shifts the votes significantly towards Democrats. The political benefit for Democrats is biggest among center-right white voters, particularly white non-college voters and those outside of the Denver Metro region.

Generic Legislative Ballot Reframed Generic Ballot Change

Lindsey Graham's national abortion ban is a big motivator for center-left women – and a de-motivator for Republicans

As noted earlier in this report, Democratic motivation to vote is now in line with Republican motivation, an improvement from initial attitudes we polled over the summer. However, the issue of abortion has the potential to shift the equation further in Democrats' favor. When we tell voters that Republicans in the U.S. Senate have recently introduced legislation to ban abortion nationwide, it **boosts motivation among pro-choice voters and Democratic and unaffiliated women while, perhaps just as important, significantly decreasing motivation among anti-choice voters and Republicans.**

As you may know, Republicans in the U.S. Senate recently introduced legislation to ban abortion nationwide.

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About the Study

Global Strategy Group conducted a public opinion survey among a sample of 800 registered voters in Colorado, between October 6 and October 11, 2022. The margin of error at the 95% confidence level for Colorado voters is +/- 3.5%. The margin of error on sub-samples is greater. The survey was conducted over the phone and online, with online respondents recruited from multiple opt-in online panel vendors. Respondents were verified against a voter file, and special care was taken to ensure the demographic composition of our sample matched that of Colorado's registered voter population across a variety of demographic variables including party registration, race, gender, age, education, region, and population density.
