
# THE MELTING POT

#### GSG'S ONGOING LOOK AT RACIAL POLITICS IN AMERICA





### INTRODUCTORY NOTE

Global Strategy Group surveyed a total of 784 Black registered voters nationwide, including oversamples among men and Gen-Z voters. Sample sizes among key populations include 491 Black male voters, 285 Black female voters, and 100 Black Gen-Z voters. The survey was conducted March 9, through March 19, 2023.

Over the last few years there have been many Democrats who have voiced concerns about Black men – particularly younger Black men – and their seemingly growing openness to Republicans and GOP messaging. In 2020, exit polls showed that 12% of Black men voted for Donald Trump – compared to only 6% of Black women – and in important national (and local) elections where every vote matters there is a lot riding on keeping the Black electorate in the Democratic column.


In order to explore this subject, we decided to oversample Black men for this survey, however the results of this poll strongly suggested that there wasn't very much difference between the attitudes of younger Black men and the attitudes of younger Black women when it comes to the two parties, their political perceptions and ballot box preferences. This poll points to the reality that Democrats need to be paying greater attention to both younger Black male and younger Black female voters. Differences across the Black electorate have much more to do with age and generation than with gender.

But even the differences across generations don't tell the full story of how or whether Black people will vote. In addition to age, there are two additional factors that highly correlate to Black voter turnout: feelings of efficacy as a voter and the degree of alignment with Democratic policies. In addition, while conducting this analysis we confirmed a new paradigm recently suggested by a Black academic from Stanford, Hakeem Jefferson, regarding how to think about political ideology in the Black community, we've unpacked the types of individual-level factors that impact Black voters' motivation to participate in the political process, and the data even reveals some fascinating findings about Black voters who use FOX News and other conservative media as one of their primary sources of news.




### Black voters lack confidence in most American institutions, including our most prominent political institutions



# Just under half of Black voters completely or mostly align themselves with Democratic party policies, but a quarter are not aligned with the party on the issues







# THE DEMOCRATS' BLACK POLITICAL LANDSCAPE

Do you approve or disapprove of the job <u>Republicans in Congress</u> are doing handling the issues most important to you?




# Voters are most aligned with Democrats on voting rights, Social Security & Medicare, and health care, but fall off on inflation and immigration – particularly among younger Black voters

## More than half of self-identified Black independents are not aligned with Democrats on the issues, but more than a third of self-identified Republicans are at least somewhat aligned with Democratic policies




#### A majority of younger Black voters rely heavily on social media for news about government and current events
